

DENTAL HYGIENE PROGRAM Academic Year 2025-2026

To Prospective Dental Hygiene Students:

Dental Hygiene is an exciting career for an individual to pursue. As a member of the oral health team, the dental hygienist has the unique opportunity to participate in a challenging and rewarding field providing preventive, therapeutic, and educational services. The employment opportunities available to dental hygienists are numerous. They may choose to pursue a career in a variety of clinical settings that include private practices, large clinics, specialized areas of dentistry, and government agencies. The graduates may also further their education through advanced degree programs to prepare for a career in teaching, public health, or research.

The Dental Hygiene Program at Daytona State College is a two-year Associate of Science Degree program accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation. It includes course content in general education, biomedical sciences, dental and dental hygiene sciences, and clinical dental hygiene. During clinical sessions, students are taught to remove deposits from tooth surfaces, polish tooth surfaces, obtain radiographic images, provide oral health education, and perform preventive procedures.

The goal of the Dental Hygiene Program is to educate students to possess the knowledge and skills necessary to provide quality patient-centered care to diverse population groups in a variety of health care settings. Students are also prepared to recognize the need for personal and professional growth by participating in professional activities, contributing to community projects, and attending professional meetings.

The Dental Hygiene Program begins every Summer Term B (term starts in the beginning of July) and is offered on the DeLand Campus. Applications are submitted and accepted once a year during the month of February. Completed applications can only be submitted to Melissa Brown-Mack, Academic Advisor. Her office is in Building 320, Room 549 on the Daytona Beach campus. Applicants may mail their application to: Melissa Brown-Mack, Academic Advisor, Daytona State College, P.O. Box 2811, Daytona Beach, Florida 32120-2811. There are sixteen (16) dental hygiene students accepted each year. Applicants will be notified by the end of April for acceptance into the class starting in July.

Frequently Asked Questions and Supplemental Information

1. What are the employment opportunities for dental hygienists?

The employment opportunities for dental hygienists in Volusia and Flagler Counties are excellent. There is an increasing demand for dental hygienists in both general and specialized areas of dentistry. Job placement for graduates from this Program is very good.

2. What is the average salary that one can earn upon graduating from this program? The average salary for an entry-level dental hygiene position is approximately between \$36.00 to \$43.00 per hour in Volusia and Flagler Counties.

3. What are the typical working hours for this profession? Most dental practices are open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. In addition, there are some private practices and dental clinics open during evening hours and on Saturday.

4. Is there a board examination that one must take upon completion of this program?

There are two examinations the student must take to practice dental hygiene. The first examination is the National Board Dental Hygiene Examination (NBDHE) and the second examination is for state licensure. Students must pass the NBDHE before taking most state/regional licensure examinations. The NBDHE is a computer-based examination administered by the Joint Commission on National Dental Examinations. Students take the NBDHE during their last semester prior to graduation. The cost for this board examination is approximately \$565.00.

5. Is licensure required for employment for this profession?

A license is required to practice dental hygiene in the State of Florida as well as in most states. There are two parts to state licensure examinations that consist of a written and a clinical/practical section. A candidate must pass both sections of the licensing board exam to obtain a dental hygiene license.

The Florida ADEX licensure examination for Dental Hygiene is usually scheduled in April/May/June and November. Students usually take the licensing examination in April/May/June, right before or right after they graduate from the program and successfully pass the NBDHE. The total fee, which includes the clinical and written portions, is approximately \$1,500.00.

6. What are the hours of the Dental Hygiene program?

The hours of the Dental Hygiene Program are typically from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

7. How much does the program cost? Are there additional costs such as books, lab fees, uniforms, and supplies?

The tuition and fees for Florida residents is approximately \$9,687 and for non-residents is \$35,200. Additional costs that should be budgeted are approximately \$10,759. The approximate cost for tuition and fees (based on FL residents) and miscellaneous is \$20,446 as outlined.

8. Is there a physical examination and/or immunizations required prior to the start of this program?

Students are required to undergo a physical evaluation, to be immunized against tetanus-diphtheria, and tested for tuberculosis **prior** to the start of the Dental Hygiene Program. They are also encouraged to be immunized against other infectious diseases such as, mumps, measles, and rubella. Students are required to provide documentation of having begun the Hepatitis B Vaccination series **before** the first day of First Year Fall semester courses. If a student is medically at risk, they will be required to sign a declination form. The Dental Hygiene Program does not discriminate against applicants or students with infectious diseases in accordance with federal and state law and regulations.

9. Are there any occupational hazards with this occupation?

Dental hygienists are exposed to several occupational hazards working in the dental field. Dental hygienists could be exposed to infections such as HIV and Hepatitis, radiation, musculoskeletal problems, dermatitis, respiratory problems, and/or eye injuries.

10. Is a background screening required prior to the start of this program?

Students are required to complete a Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) Level II background screening and drug screening prior to enrolling in the program. The cost of this background check is approximately \$90.00. An instruction sheet will be provided to students once they have been accepted into the program.

11. What are the application requirements?

- <u>Observation Hours</u>: an applicant must complete eight (8) observation hours of a dental hygienist in a general dentistry or periodontal practice; and not in the practice in which they are currently employed. The accepted Observation Hours documentation form is attached to this packet.
- <u>TEAS</u>: an applicant must take the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS). The TEAS test is a standardized, multiple-choice exam. For more details visit <u>https://www.daytonastate.edu/testing-center/placement-testing.html</u>. An applicant must meet the Composite score of 65% or better. Beginning July 1, 2025, the TEAS Exam will only be accepted if taken at DSC. Applicants that have taken and passed the exam prior to this date will still be allowed to submit those scores as long as they are valid three years from the test date. The TEAS test may be taken at Daytona State College on the Daytona, DeLand, Deltona, Flagler/Palm Coast or New Smyrna Beach campus. An Information sheet is attached to this packet.

12. What courses must be taken prior to starting the program?

Before taking the prerequisite courses, an applicant may be required to take the Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (PERT). Applicants who are exempt from any placement testing are:

- Applicants who **started** high school in the 9th grade in 2003 or after at a **Florida Public** high school AND **graduated** from a Florida Public high school with a standard high school diploma
- Applicants serving as an active-duty member of any branch of the U.S. Armed Services

Applicants who have successfully completed college level English and/or Math may be exempt as well. All other applicants will be required to take the Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (PERT) and be at the 10th grade level for reading, language, and arithmetic. If you have any questions about your exemption status, contact an Academic Advisor for assistance. Applicants <u>must</u> have a **combined** cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 or better to be eligible to apply.

There are *five* prerequisite courses applicants *must* take and *complete before applying*. These courses are:

13. If one has taken previous courses, will they count in this program?

Applicants who have taken the prerequisite courses and/or general education courses may receive credit. Course work in these areas will be considered for transfer credit at the discretion of the College's respective department chairperson for that discipline. It is the applicant's responsibility to contact the Daytona State College's respective department chairperson for course substitution if applicable.

Applicants who have completed a dental assisting program accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) may receive credit for **DES 1100C Elements of Dental Materials and Lab**. This dental assisting program must be CODA accredited prior to the Dental Hygiene Program's admission window. The Chairperson of the School of Dental Sciences will consider this course for transfer credit **ONLY** if the applicant has taken this course within a **two-year** timeframe at a dental assisting program that is accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation. It is **strongly recommended** that prospective students who are accepted into the Dental Hygiene Program give serious consideration toward taking this course.

Applicants who are transferring dental hygiene courses from a dental hygiene program accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) may receive credit for some courses. The Chairperson of the School of Dental Sciences will consider these courses for transfer credit **ONLY** if the applicant has taken these courses within **one-year** of being accepted into the DSC Dental Hygiene Program. Dental Hygiene clinical courses are **not** eligible for transfer credit.

14. Is there a clinical component required for this program?

During the first year, students begin providing dental hygiene care to patients in the Spring Semester. First year students are in clinical sessions eight hours per week, and second year students are in clinical sessions twelve hours a week. Students are required to maintain current Basic Life Support for Healthcare Providers (CPR) certification while participating in patient care activities during preclinical and clinical sessions. Students are required to CPR requirement **before** entering the Dental Hygiene Program in August.

15. How does one apply for admission to this program and when does it begin?

The Dental Hygiene Program admits sixteen (16) students each year. Classes begin in the beginning of July; Summer Term B. Applications are accepted **once** a year during the month of February. Applications must be **received** by the last business (working) day in February. The applicant **must** have **completed**: **eight (8) observation hours** of a dental hygienist in a dental practice where they are not currently employed; the **TEAS Test** and met the minimal Composite score; and the **five prerequisite courses** *before* submitting the application packet for it to be received. The applicant must request official transcripts from other educational institutions attended to be sent to Daytona State College's Admissions Department. These official transcripts **must** be received by the College's Admissions Department by the end of February for the application to be considered for program entry.

Applicants will be notified by the end of April for acceptance into the class starting in July. Applications are to be submitted to Melissa Brown-Mack, Academic Advisor. 16. Is the selection process based on a points system?

Yes, since this program is a **Limited Access Program**, students are selected based on the following criteria. The sixteen (16) applicants with the highest cumulative points are the sixteen (16) students accepted into the program.

Mission

The mission of the Dental Hygiene Program is the development of professional, ethical, and competent members of the oral health team who provide quality, patient-centered care to diverse population groups in a variety of health care settings. The Dental Hygiene Program is committed to excellence in teaching and learning, emphasizing student success.

Description

Students are taught to remove deposits from tooth surfaces; provide methods of oral physiotherapy; obtain and analyze dental digital radiographic images; provide oral health education as well as acquire knowledge in methods of infection control practices. Dental hygienists are licensed professionals who, under the supervision of a licensed dentist, provide preventive, therapeutic, and educational services. During the last semester of this program, students are eligible to take the National Board Dental Hygiene Examination. Upon successfully passing the National Board Dental Hygiene Examination and graduating from the program, graduates are eligible to take state/regional licensure examinations.

Program Accreditation

The Dental Hygiene Program is accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation and has been granted the accreditation status of "approval without reporting requirements". The Commission is a specialized accrediting body recognized by the United States Department of Education. - 5. Evaluate current scientific literature as a basis for life-long learning, evidence-based practice and as a foundation for adapting to changes in health care.

Additional Admission Requirements

- This is a Limited Access Program. Continuing enrollment approval will be required to enroll in program specific courses based on a selection process after completing the required general education courses.
- Applicants must have a standard high school diploma (or GED) and be at least 18 years of age to enroll.
- Applicants who started high school in the 9th grade in 2003 or after at a Florida Public high school AND graduated from a Florida Public high school with a standard high school diploma are exempt from any placement testing. Active-duty military applicants are also exempt from any placement testing. Those applicants who have successfully completed college level English and/or Math may be exempt as well. All other applicants will be required to take the Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (PERT) and be at the 10th grade level for reading, language, and arithmetic. Contact an Academic Advisor for assistance.
- Completion of health screening to include: recent physical examination; verification of immunization against tetanus-diphtheria, measles, mumps, rubella and Hepatitis B; and a negative PPD test (or chest x-ray if indicated) for tuberculosis are required **prior** to the start of Fall semester program specific courses.
- Basic Life Support (BLS) certification for the Health Care Provider, to include adults, infant, children, and automatic external defibrillator (AED); through the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross is required **prior** to the start of Fall semester program specific courses.
- Admission into the program will be contingent on the satisfactory completion of both a drug screen and background check consisting of a fingerprint check of state and federal criminal history information conducted through the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) and Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). This must be completed **prior** to the first day of program specific courses (Summer Semester B).
- Program prerequisite, general education and dental hygiene courses must be completed with a grade of "C" or better.

Students will be held accountable for the policy and procedures of the Dental Hygiene Program as • outlined in the Dental Hygiene Student Policy Handbook, as well as the College Student Handbook.

Additional Completion Requirements

- Submit completed School of Dental Sciences application for continuing enrollment to the Academic Advisor in the College of Health and Public Services only during the month of February.
- Student selection for continuing enrollment is based on specific admission criteria and a points • system. Selection is made once per year. The Program starts annually in July.
- Combined cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or better is required to apply for continuing • enrollment.
- Completion of the following courses with a grade of "C" or better is required before submitting an application for continuing enrollment: ENC 1101 Introduction to Composition; MGF 2130 Mathematical Thinking (MAC 1105 College Algebra or MGF 2106 Survey in Mathematics also accepted); BSC 1085C Human Anatomy and Physiology I and Lab; BSC 1086C Human Anatomy and Physiology II and Lab; and CHM 1025C Introduction to Chemistry and Lab.
- Completion of the Test of Essential Academic Skills (ATI TEAS) with minimum Composite score of 65% • is required before submitting an application for continuing enrollment. Tests may not be combined to show minimum score achievement. Applicants may test a total of four (4) times within a calendar year (Jan-Dec). Only TEAS scores taken at DSC or a Florida public institution of higher education, or proctored online by ATI will be accepted. TEAS scores are good for three (3) years from test date. Approximate cost of the TEAS Test is \$115.00.
- Completion of a minimum of eight (8) observation hours of a dental hygienist in a general dentistry or ٠ periodontal practice, where you are not currently employed, is required before submitting an application for continuing enrollment.
- Applicants for continuing enrollment who have graduated within a **two-year** time frame from an • accredited (Commission on Dental Accreditation) dental assisting program may receive credit for DES 1100C Elements of Dental Materials and Lab. Transfer of credit for this course will be at the discretion of the Chairperson.

The TEAS (Test of Essential Academic Skills) is required for application to the Dental Hygiene, Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN), Associate Degree in Nursing (RN-ADN), Transition to Professional Nursing, and Radiography programs at Daytona State College.

PREPARATION

The TEAS on-line practice assessment and study guide are available from Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) at **<u>atitesting.com</u>** Information about the test format as well as how to prepare for the test is available on the web site. In addition, the Academic Support Center (ASC) can be utilized for tutoring and study materials.

Please plan to start your test a minimum of 4 to 4.5 hours before the Assessment office closes. See the Assessment Services website for hours of each campus. INSTRUCTIONS

- Step 1: Prior to the exam, students <u>must</u> create an account online with ATI at <u>atitesting.com/teas</u>
 See instructions on the back of this handout. This log in information will be required to take the TEAS test with Assessment Services at Daytona State College.
- Step 2: Prepare to spend 4-4½ hours from beginning to end for registration and testing. Students must arrive to start their TEAS test 4 to 4.5 hours before the Assessment office closes. Testers must have a valid photo ID, debit or credit card to pay ATI for the TEAS exam and their receipt for payment of DSC proctor fee. A valid photo ID is required to take the TEAS.
- Step 3: Pay the \$15 DSC Proctor Fee (\$30 for non-DSC students) to Student Accounts on campus or over the phone at 386-506-3024. Testers must bring either a printed copy of their receipt or they can show it electronically on their mobile device. There is an additional cost of \$70 to purchase the test through ATI once at the testing center. Students will have to have a debit or credit card to purchase the test through ATI during Step 4.
- Step 4: Assessment Services will place the student in a testing room where they will use their ATI log-in information from Step 1 to pay for their TEAS Exam through ATI online. Once this is complete and verified, the student will then begin the test. The test is timed and can take 4 hours to complete. Questions will cover topics of Mathematics, Reading, Science, and English/Language Usage. Calculators are built into the test when allowed. Handheld calculators are <u>NOT</u> allowed when taking the TEAS test.

For the ATI TEAS, the following criteria must be met for ALL PROGRAMS: Adjusted Individual Total Score (AITS) 65th percentile or better

- Examinees may test a total of four (4) times within a calendar year (Jan-Dec).
- Beginning July 1, 2025, the TEAS Exam will only be accepted if taken at DSC. Applicants that have taken and passed the exam prior to this date will still be allowed to submit those scores as long as they are valid three years from the test date.
- Retesting can be administered after a 30-day wait (on the 31st day). Students who wish to retest on the TEAS must pay the current DSC and ATI test fees each time.
- Scores are good for 3 years.

If you do not receive a passing score in each category, it is recommended that you utilize the **Academic Support Center (ASC)** for tutoring (see ASC website for further information).
