





GRANTS OFFICE UPDATE

Welcome to the 2023-24 annual report for the Office of Resource Development. With the team restored to full staffing (4 FTE), significant strides were made in streamlining processes, improving practices, and rebalancing workloads. These efforts have enhanced efficiency and effectiveness, setting a solid foundation for future growth.

In 2023-2024, DSC submitted 24 grant proposals and secured nearly \$4 million in new grant funding from federal, state, and local sources. Notably, the state awarded DSC grant funding to support the Education, Auto, and Nursing programs. These funds have enabled the launch of new initiatives, expansion of enrollment, and support for critical programs that benefit the community.

Appreciation is extended to the DSC Foundation for their generous support of the second annual Grantsgiving event held in November 2023. This event celebrated the work of the grant teams and the many staff college-wide who are essential to ensuring the success of every grant project. *Grants Make the Magic Happen*, an apt theme for the event, highlighted the meaningful impact grants have on the lives of DSC students. The teamwork involved in securing and managing grants truly makes a difference.

Farewell to Dr. Lisa Koogle

A new director will be hired to lead Resource Development beginning in 2025, following the retirement of Dr. Lisa Koogle. Lisa spent ten years at the College, seven in the Director role including the unpredictable pandemic-related funding years. In preparing to leave, Lisa offered the following:



4-YEAR FUND RATE COMPARISON






Higher Education Emergency Relief Funding (HEERF)

The COVID-19 pandemic brought unprecedented challenges to higher education institutions across the nation. In response, the federal government established the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) to provide critical financial support to colleges and universities. This funding aimed to mitigate the impact of the pandemic, ensuring that institutions could continue to serve their students and communities effectively.

Daytona State received a total of \$54,143,384 in HEERF funding, allocated as follows:

- \$22,379,239 for student aid, which was used to provide direct financial assistance to students facing economic hardships due to the pandemic. This support helped students cover essential expenses such as tuition, housing, and technology needed for remote learning.
- \$29,516,587 for institutional needs, which enabled DSC to address the myriad challenges posed by the pandemic. These funds were used to enhance online learning infrastructure, implement health and safety measures on campus, and support faculty and staff in adapting to new modes of instruction.
- \$2,247,558 specifically for Title III Strengthening Institution Program participants, which supported initiatives aimed at improving institutional capacity and student success. This funding was crucial in helping the College maintain and strengthen programs for underserved and at-risk student populations.

HEERF funding was instrumental to navigating the complexities of the pandemic, ensuring the College could continue to provide high-quality education and support to students during a challenging time while building a resilient and thriving educational environment.



Student Success Stories

Esperanza Brock

Esperanza Brock graduated with a 3.5 GPA in May 2024 with her associate degree in Radiography. This achievement allowed her to sit for her boards and become a Registered Technologist. Earning this degree and title has profoundly changed her life; she is now employed at Halifax Health as a Cardiac Catheterization Technologist.

With her new job, Esperanza has been able to move her family into their first apartment, where they are now thriving. She attributes this success to the support she received from the Childcare Access Means Parents in School (CCAMPIS) program at DSC. The program enabled her, as a new mom, to attend school and set her family up for a lifetime of success. Esperanza expresses her heartfelt gratitude to the CCAMPIS program and DSC for truly transforming her life and her family's future.



Ke-Ni Cleary

Ke-Ni Cleary is the first in her family to pursue postsecondary education and has displayed determination to share the power of education and its hope for a brighter future. Ke-Ni is a former participant in TRiO Upward Bound, a grant-funded program at DSC with the purpose of helping to eliminate barriers of 9-12 grade Mainland High School students who face financial challenges and are potential first-generation college students. The Upward Bound staff met Ke-Ni as a junior at Mainland High School, struggling to form concrete ideas of what she hoped to accomplish after graduating. Although the tangible concept of college was a blur when first joining Upward Bound, her persistent attendance eventually led to a successful senior year and a clear understanding of the woman she wanted to become. Ke-Ni dreams of one day becoming a mental health therapist, hoping to guide others to overcome obstacles.



DSC CARES

Grantor: Department of Justice

DSC CARES builds upon the previous DOJ grant to continue raising awareness and preventing sexual violence and stalking throughout the campus community through training, educational activities, and collaboration with partner agencies.

SMP ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING

Grantor: National Endowment for the Humanities

The Preservation Assistance Grant allowed the Southeast Museum of Photography to purchase, install, and train staff to use environmental monitoring devices to assess the light, temperature, and humidity levels throughout the Museum to preserve and protect its collection.

STATE

FLEETFORCE CDL TRAINING

Grantor: FL Department of Commerce

As part of a Florida Job Growth consortium grant, DSC is collaborating with Fleetforce Truck Driving School to host a Commercial Driver License training program at the Advanced Technology Center (ATC). Funding provides partial tuition and scholarships, as well as parking lot improvements to train students in this high-demand field.

GROW YOUR OWN TEACHER APPRENTICE PROGRAM

Grantor: FL Department of Education

The GYO program is designed to address the critical need for K-12 teachers by delivering the Bachelor of Science in Education degree as a registered apprenticeship program. DSC Education faculty are working with subject matter experts to modify and implement the BSED for apprentices employed by Volusia, Flagler and Brevard County school districts. The first cohort began in Fall 2024.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT CAPITALIZATION INCENTIVE GRANT (CAP) - AUTO

Grantor: FL Department of Education

The project provides new welding booths and other instructional equipment and supplies with the goal of increasing enrollment and dual enrollment in the Auto Collision, Repair, and Refinishing program.

LINKING INDUSTRY TO NURSING EDUCATION (LINE 2023)

Grantor: FL Department of Education

Healthcare partner Halifax Health and Daytona State College Foundation provided funding to create an endowed scholarship program for nursing students while grant funds are used to purchase equipment, technology, and digital resources to support student success and completion.

LIGHTHOUSE POINT PARK RESTORATION PROJECT (LP2R)

Grantor: Indian River Lagoon National Estuary Program

Dr. Jennifer Bell launched an initiative to engage K-12 students in conducting water sampling and seagrass restoration activities at Lighthouse Point Park in Ponce Inlet, part of the Indian River Lagoon system. Funds were used to purchase sampling kits, field-work materials, promote environmental stewardship, and increase public awareness.

LAUNCH TO SUCCESS

Grantor: Truist

The Launch to Success program is designed to expand the College's current Entrepreneurship Education and Training program through mentoring, pitch competitions, and expanding the EET Resource Center with an additional location on the Deltona campus.

PROJECT SCHOOL EMERGENCY RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE (PROJECT SERV)

Grantor: U.S. Department of Education

Grant funds were utilized to restore disruption to the learning environment caused by Hurricanes Ian and Nicole by securing an after-hours crisis intervention hotline and other resources to address student mental health needs. A total of 86 crisis calls were addressed by on-campus counselors to provide ongoing emotional support services and new digital tools were implemented to support student mental health.

INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY CENTER OF ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Grantor: Defense Intelligence Agency

The mission of the consortium program was to increase the diversity of the U.S. intelligence community by exposing a wider range of students, including those from diverse and lower-income backgrounds, to explore technology careers through speaker events, job fairs, clubs, and internships opportunities. Approximately 150 DSC students were actively engaged in a minimum of three events per year. Neighboring institutions were invited to attend, and a robust social media presence extended the impact of the program.

ADVANCED TECHNOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Grantor: National Science Foundation

DSC participated as a Case Study College Partner with Rutgers School of Management and Labor Statistics, Education and Employment Research Center to conduct research that examined Technician Education programs at community colleges and their direct impact on economic development.

LINKING INDUSTRY TO NURSING EDUCATION (LINE 2022)

Grantor: FL Department of Education

Halifax Health and AdventHealth partnered with DSC to establish an endowed faculty Student Success Specialist position and nursing scholarships. Grant funds were used to purchase patient simulation equipment, software, and digital resources.

Grantor: Women United

In support of student-parents with young children utilizing the Falcon HOPE Center, grant funds were used to purchase hygiene items, changing tables, diaper genies, a mini fridge for formula, a highchair, and 10 kid-friendly "Tool Kits for Kids" containing tablets, headphones, and sensory toys to ensure that students accompanied by young children can safely access and study on campus.





2023-2024 Looking Ahead

As we move beyond the multi-year influx of federal and state funds issued in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, grant opportunities and funding levels are beginning to return to prepandemic norms. However, some level of unpredictability is likely to persist throughout 2024-25, particularly with the election of a new administration in November and the resulting changes in federal agency funding priorities. Despite this, certain areas of focus among grantors and agencies remain consistent, including student mental health and a wide range of workforce initiatives.

In addition, new changes to 2 CFR 200 Uniform Guidance, the regulations designed to guard against fraud, waste, and abuse in federally funded projects, will be implemented by the end of 2024. The Office of Resource Development continues to monitor the potential impact of these changes on DSC grants to ensure all projects remain compliant with the new standards. Our commitment to maintaining rigorous compliance and effective grant management practices is resolute, as we strive to maximize the impact of every dollar received.

The Learner Engagement, Navigation, and Support (LENS) project, known to many as "Title III", concludes in Fall 2024 after five years of dedicated efforts to strengthen the institution. Among the notable outcomes of LENS are the "You Belong Here" welcome message and campaign, the Online Success Seminar, a newly designed DSC website, and much more. This project has engaged dozens of DSC personnel, all ably led by Project Director Dr. Amy Locklear and Project Manager Kat Fulco. We extend heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to the College's success through this prestigious federal grant.

As we look to the future, the Office of Resource Development remains committed to identifying and securing new funding opportunities, fostering strategic partnerships, and supporting innovative projects that advance our mission. Together, we will continue to make a meaningful difference in the lives of our students and the broader community.



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
