



Featured Grant

A new Florida Department of Education grant, Linking Industry to Nursing Education, or LINE, provided an opportunity to make advancements in the Bob and Carol Allen School of Nursing. The Resource Development team worked closely with our Institutional Advancement colleagues as well as School of Nursing leaders to design a project that would bring significant new support to the Nursing program.

Healthcare partners Halifax Health and AdventHealth committed \$1,000,000 and \$900,000, respectively, enabling the College to endow a new faculty Student Success Specialist position, install new educational software, and purchase a broad range of new patient simulation equipment for use in the program.

The healthcare partner funds were key to securing matching funds from the FLDOE, for a total \$3,800,000 awarded for Nursing education that will directly impact the lives of hundreds of students annually.

2022-2023 Resource Development Annual Report

Resource Development remains committed to supporting the mission of Daytona State College through the thoughtful design and submission of grant proposals and the careful stewardship of funds awarded. The opportunity to create a positive impact on the lives of DSC students remains front and center as we work to identify possible funding sources, develop compelling proposals, and effectively manage grant projects.

Surprises and success were the themes of the 2022-2023 year in grants. The Resource Development team saw a continuation of the unpredictability originally set in motion by the pandemic, as surfeit federal funds became available in unexpected ways. While the timelines were often challenging, the results were largely positive and led to new opportunities for the College. Thirty-one applications were submitted with 25 projects selected for funding, four declined, and two remained in pending status as of this publication. The 81% funding success rate is the highest in about a decade. Funds awarded totaled \$13,932,875, compared to the \$14,891,166 requested, or 94%.

The success is noteworthy given the fact that Resource Development operated with three full-time staff throughout the full fiscal year, down from four staff in recent years. Additional part-time support was made available for part of the year to assist in managing the Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds, or HEERF. As of this writing, the department is back to four full-time staff.

Sources of grant funding continued to be primarily federal, federal pass-through, and state agencies, but even within known agencies there were surprising new initiatives that led to important opportunities.






FUND RATE

Funded Submissions



Grantsgiving

With generous support from the Daytona State College Foundation, Resource Development hosted a Grantsgiving celebration in November 2022, the first such gathering in a number of years. All staff and faculty working directly in grant-funded programs as well as the many individuals and departments across the College who support our grant teams and activities gathered to share lunch and our theme of gratitude. Grants are, most decidedly, a team activity and we are profoundly grateful for the many team members who put their individual commitment and collective expertise to work each day.

Looking Ahead... 2023-2024

Some federal grant programs allow applicants to reapply for new funding to employ fresh strategies for positive impact. The College has been successful in securing new funding through two federal agencies for such purposes. The U.S. Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women has awarded a third round of funding to DSC for The Campus Program, which implements educational and awareness activities to address sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking throughout the campus community. The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded the Southeast Museum of Photography its second Preservation Assistance Grant to enable continued efforts at preserving the Museum's permanent collection.

Key work is underway this year to wind down spending of the Higher Education Emergency Relief funds and thoroughly document how these crucial funds were used by the College to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the pandemic. The College received more than \$54 million in HEERF funding in three disbursements during 2020 and 2021. Funds were targeted for direct student emergency support as well as for institutional needs and initiatives.
